Dick Vermeil, Person of the Year

Throughout the 20 years of existence of the Philadelphia chapter of the Broadcast Ploneers we have honored as Person of the Year an eclectic roster. Included are an entertainer, on-air personalities such as a sports reporter and a news anchor, an orchestra conductor, a member of the judiciary, station and group owners, a true ploneer who dated back to the genesis of commercial broadcasting, teachers and scholars and a top sales person. This year we're honoring another first, a genuine sports person who left the turmoil of the playing fields for the relative tranquility of the broadcast booth: Dick Vermeil.

On Wednesday, April 30, at the Adams Mark Hotel, we'll do honor to the former skipper of the Philadelphia Eagles, the 49-year-old California-born motivator who brought our pro football team to a state of respectability, made it a winner and then left the demanding job of coaching, suffering from "burnout." Vermell didn't leave he game completely. He made the transition to color commentator, analyzing and evaluating pro football activities for CBS Television Sports.

Dick has remained a citizen of our community as an on-camera commercial spokesman for Cadillacs and other products consistent with his background as a class act, as well as lending his presence to many of the sports world activities that originate in our valley.

Meet the Members


In the last several newsletters we introduced a new veteran with an older (in point of membership) Pioneer. In this issue we're showcasing two of our chapter's dedicated officers. He is Bill Garry, the Commodore, the treasurer. She is Grace Kenny, the ex-nightingale, the chapter's secretary. Both are native to our market.

The Commodore

Bill Garry, president and general manager of WBCB-AM, Levittown, since 1972, truly aspired to the radio industry. As a youthful teenager, he built his first crystal set in 1925. At 18 he was a founding member of the Delaware Valley Radio Association – radio hams. Bill's call letters were W3BWF then, W20UN now.

He received his first-class phone license in 1941 and in

1942 became a full-time studio and transmitter engineer at WTTM, Trenton. Six years later at WBUD, Morrisville Bill switched from engineer to time salesman, ultimately becoming vice president of sales. He was now and forever a full-time administrative and sales executive in the radio industry.



Bill moved to WBCB in 1962 as local sales manager, where he's spent the past 23 years of a distinguised career. He's been mulling over retirement for several years now and when he leaves broadcasting he can extend both his avocation and hobby, boating, into something very meaningful. Bill is boating columnist for the Trenton Times, the Atlantic City Press and the Bergen Record. He has served the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary as district commodore and national vice-commodore.

Bill Garry has retired. The man of the air, figuratively, has become the man of the sea literally. Anchors aweigh.

The Nightingale

In her very early teens she was a songbird with the Skipper Dawes choral group which appeared on a quarter-hour ABC radio show, "Melodies to Remember", featuring another South Philadelphian, Eddie Fisher. This was her swan song as an entertainer; everything thereafter for Grace Kenny was behind the camera. Later when she graduated from high school she started as production assistant with the Paul Whiteman Philadelphia-based network TV Teen Club.

Then began a 35-year association with Triangle and later



with Capital Cities, the last 15 years of which were as traffic manager for WPVI-TV. (Further, her experience in radio sales prepared her to handle all radio contracts, bookings and clearing time, as well as the double bugaboos of sales discrepancies: billing problems and makegoods.)

For the benefit of the uninitiated here's what a first-class traffic manager with a major station like Channel 6 does. She supervises the processing of all commercial films, tapes, slides and cartridges. She prepares work logs for the sales department containing all program information, including segment times, for syndicated programs and programs and feature films. She also supervises the insertion of all commercial numbers on logs with correct rotation and handles final checking of each log for correct automation information.

Somewhere out in the domain of television are more than a dozen proficient traffic managers all trained by Grace Kenny. What a wonderful legacy.
